Communities of Belonging—From Kenya to Ottawa. In Korogocho, one of Nairobi, Kenya’s largest slum communities, Sharon and her mother, Asenath, have long struggled to access the physiotherapy Sharon needs to manage Cerebral Palsy. When the local therapy centre closed, the care she depended on became impossible to reach, leaving her family without vital support. **This past year, your generosity through the Belongathon changed everything.** A new physiotherapy room at Mount Moriah School is now providing essential therapy for Sharon and other children with disabilities. The space has quickly become a hub where families, educators, and community workers come together to support children’s learning, development, and inclusion. For Sharon and her family, the room represents hope, dignity, and belonging.

A Place to Find Your Voice

One beautiful snowy weekend this past January, seven families traveled to Hidden Acres Mennonite Camp in New Hamburg, ON, for a winter Family Camp. Respite services like Family Camp are in such high demand, and Karis goes above and beyond to make camp a space for quality time, faith activities, and fun.

This was Lorraine, 18 years old, and her mom, Christian's, second time at a Karis Family Camp. Both mother and daughter have a disability and benefit from the camp's inclusive and supported environment. As Lorraine moves from child services and into the world of adult services,

opportunities like Family Camp are helping her develop independence and confidence. Her two favourite parts of camp are "the food" and "sleeping." Since the last camp, she's been inspired to take on a bigger role as a leader and mentor.

Family Camps are designed for the whole family, and it would not be possible without amazing, dedicated volunteers of all ages! Each family member with a disability and all typically developing siblings under 12 are matched with a volunteer.

This personalized support is what makes Family Camp so special, and Carla's experience shows just how meaningful that can be. Carla is seven years old and two of her

older brothers have a disability. At Family Camp, she was matched with Grace, a high school student who was also a first-time volunteer. All weekend long, Carla chose what she wanted to do: draw, dance, decorate cookies, swing outside in the snow, and sing with Grace. She didn't have to go at the pace of her siblings or do what her older brothers wanted to do. Her brothers also enjoyed this tailored and supported camp experience with their volunteers!

Changing Minds, Transforming Lives

In Asella, Ethiopia, Horizons Academy shines as a beacon of hope for families who experience disability. This school, through its inclusive education program, is creating a ripple effect of

transformative change. For many parents, it opens the door to employment opportunities.

Before access to inclusive education, Rebira's father, Berhanu, had to work at night and raise his son during the day, an exhausting routine that left little time for anything else. Now, 12-year-old Rebira can go to school during the day, and his father can return to his work as a teacher. Through disability support, Berhanu can get more rest and better take care of his family.

Because students like Rebira can attend school, his father also notes that now "most of the students are aware about disabilities." This shift has made a big difference in the

ways they feel supported by their community. Through education and inclusion in everyday life, people who once shunned Rebira's family now see them as a part of the community. "It's very interesting. It's changing not only those in society, but the mentality of the parents also. We are proud to have such kind of children," says Berhanu.

Through your contributions to community partnerships, accessible education, and development, Rebira and his family can participate in everyday life, feeling safer, loved, and celebrated as people made in the image of God. Your partnership keeps this transformative work sustainable.

Karla's Story **Guatemala**

The Difference a Teacher Can Make

Ever since she was little, Karla always wanted to be a teacher. She is trained in special needs education and is passionate about supporting children with disabilities and their families. "What inspires me is seeing thrilled parents, being able to help their children so that they can develop," shares Karla.

Karis Disability Services partners with Escuela Rural Aldea, an elementary school in El Morro, Guatemala, an isolated, mountainous village. This partnership allows the school to offer accessible education through Teacher Karla and a resource room.

Karla says that sometimes parents have a hard time accepting their child's disability, and this was the case with one nine-year-old boy named Edgar.

His mother had received rejection from her own family and for a long time didn't allow Edgar to leave the house, not even for diagnostics or treatment. Then, Karla visited with Edgar's mother and shared with her that there were options available to her that could make her and her son's lives better. Now, Edgar is part of Karla's class and gets to go to school with his peers. Karla shares that Edgar will

even sometimes surprise her at her home with a bouquet of flowers or a chicken on special occasions. Edgar's kind heart now has a chance to shine, thanks to the programs and people you support through Karis.

Another boy in Karla's class, Elder, is also experiencing new joy and hope because of access to education. 14-year-old Elder has mobility, communication, and intellectual disabilities. At school with Teacher Karla, he can walk with more confidence and communicates through speech and sign language. He is a blessing to Karla and his classmates through his humour and his contagious big smile, expressing sincere happiness in being part of the therapy group. His parents are busy caring for six additional siblings, so Karla's committed and caring presence has been significant for Elder. His relatives express deep gratitude to Karla for the therapy and support she has provided, sharing that it has made a big difference in his life.

The area around the school has such rough and steep terrain, but recently, the community came together to build a paved road through a partnership between Karis, the village of El Morro, and the Guatemalan government. The community has made big strides in accessibility, including the

support and advocacy of Karla. "I encourage them that despite the situation they are experiencing with their children, because it is not easy," Karla says. "I [can] help them so that they can have that motivation so that they can keep going."

Karla is sincerely grateful for Karis' support and sees firsthand the difference it can make. "I appreciate the support given to the children, since for them ... it is the hope to move forward."
